Commissioner for Children and Young People

Many South Australian primary school aged children are directly supporting the important work of South Australia's Commissioner for Children and Young People, Helen Connolly, as active participants of her annual Student Voice Postcard initiative, currently being rolled out to all schools across the State. The initiative is helping Commissioner Connolly gain a clearer understanding of what is important to primary school children. She is asking this under-represented group to respond to four simple questions that invite them to tell her what matters to them most, what aspirations they have, what worries them, and what they would change to make their lives better. All responses are anonymous. No personal information is collected. The Commissioner will use the postcard responses to inform her advocacy work to improve the lives of SA's children and young people.

The CRC answered these questions representing All Saints. Some of the responses were:

I care about - my body, my family, nature, God's creation, the world, my teachers, pollution and my friends.

I want grownups to know - that we should use paper not plastic, we should be using electricity instead of coal, that they are very special even though they think they're not.

The world would be better if... no one would litter, we help each other, everyone has 13 hours sleep.

FROM THE SCHOOL COUNSELLOR Cynthia Geldenhuys

Hi Families!

The holidays are ahead of us. It sure is a time for joy and excitement but keeping in mind that for many students and families this can be a stressful and challenging time.

Following are some tips to help make the holidays restful, not stressful.

- 1. Be realistic. Considering your child's challenges when you make plans will reduce stress for anyone. If your child is anxious about meeting new people or even facing the extended family, talk to your child prior to what is going to happen. This way your child can predict and understand and will manage the celebration far better. Children who tend to be impulsive will need structure to minimize disruptive behaviour. Children with sensory challenges will find the intense holiday stimuli overwhelming, stressful, and overstimulating, especially trips to big busy shopping malls. Multiple short trips to the shops may help your child to gradually adapt and tolerate the environment a bit better.
- 2. Develop with your child a 'healthy enough' schedule to enjoy a break without staying up all night. If you are travelling bring familiar toys and books and make sure you develop a quiet bedtime routine like reading to help them relax and rest.



3. Set limits on screen time. Many kids will want to catch-up on screen time but too much time in front of the screen will result in them not sleeping well or rest well impacting the whole family. Keep to schedule as it will only be that much more difficult to drop the screen time after the holiday when having to return to school. It may seem relaxing in the moment, but many studies show the harmful and negative effects of screen time.



4. Focus on what matters for your family. Identify what the meaning of Christmas holiday is for you and celebrate it your way.

5. Be sure to laugh and have a rest yourself. Kids pick up parents' stress and tension so they're more likely to be irritable if you are. Have a sense of humour, enjoy you

kids for who they are and keep in mind that what they'll likely remember is what happened during the unexpected moments when everybody was relaxed not the brilliantly planned party etc.

We are excited to announce that Stage 1 of our new building project will commence next week, from Monday 6 December, 2021. Stage 1 will primarily be an Administration Refurbishment including:
