It is truly remarkable to consider that All Saints has reached the impressive milestone of 30 years. From its humble beginning in 1993, the school emerged from a passionate desire to foster a Catholic community in Seaford. What began as a modest initiative has blossomed into a thriving educational organisation, growing from a small cohort of 94 students to an expansive community of over 560 students today. This number is poised for further growth in the coming years, highlighting the school's commitment to providing quality education.

Throughout its three decades, All Saints has seen significant transformations in its infrastructure. As the student body expanded, so too did the school's facilities, accommodating the needs of its growing community. Notable developments include the establishment of the Gym in 2010 and the addition of the MacKillop building in 2017, both of which have enhanced the educational experience for students.

As we envision the future, 2025 will mark our 31st year at All Saints, and we are eagerly anticipating the next phase of our expansion: a brand-new double-storey building that will feature sixteen modern classrooms and dynamic breakout spaces. The anticipated completion date is set for 2026, and we are excited about the opportunities it will provide for enhanced learning and engagement.

My personal journey with All Saints began in 2013 when my family and I moved to Australia from England. We were a family of five, and finding a welcoming school for our children was a priority. My son enrolled in Reception, and from that moment, we felt an instant connection to the community. The following year, I was fortunate to secure a position as a Year 7 teacher, working alongside the dedicated Ms Dolores McCluskey.

This opportunity ignited a passion within me for All Saints that has only grown deeper over the years. Even when I worked away for a few years, my heart always remained tethered to this special place.

All Saints is more than just a school; it is a vibrant community that nurtures students' spiritual, emotional, and academic well-being. The unique culture fostered here encourages kindness, respect, and a love for learning.

THE STORY OF ALL SAINTS: A 30 YEAR JOURNEY

All Saints Catholic Primary School has a rich history that began with a dream in 1993. The school's journey started with selecting a paddock in Seaford to build a new school and worship centre. From these beginnings, All Saints has remained dedicated to fostering education and unity.

The early days of the school's development were marked by significant progress and milestones. Construction began in August 1993, and the first concrete footings were laid by September, followed by the completion of the steel frame for the administration area by the middle of the same month!

As construction progressed quickly, the roofing work started in October 1993, and Main Street was completed around the same time. By the end of October, the school showcased its uniform and building progress at the Beach Side Community Centre, generating excitement in the local community.

A family picnic for future students was held at the end of October at Market Square in Old Noarlunga, marking the beginning of the All Saints community, all waiting in anticipation for the school's future.

The School's external works were completed by December 1993, preparing for the arrival of the first students the following year.

The new year brought further progress, with the courtyard being levelled on the 27th January 1994, with only 5 days to spare before the start of the School Year! Despite ongoing construction, the school provided car covers for staff to protect their vehicles from the dust, so they could safely travel home at the end of their work day.

The first Board meeting was held on 16th February 1994, just days before the fresh green lawn was laid, bringing life and colour to the school grounds, as well as a safe play area for our first students.

One of the school's significant initiatives in 1994 was the Wirra, a patch of land next to the school that students helped plant at the school's beginning. The Wirra aims to restore the local flora and fauna, symbolising the school's connection to the environment and the Indigenous heritage of the land. Now, the Wirra is thick and full of native plants and animals!

Today, All Saints stands as a symbol of progress, tradition, and hope. The school's green lawns, bustling classrooms, new buildings and a strong sense of community reflect the vision laid out over 30 years ago.

As the school continues to evolve and grow, it holds on to the dreams of the past while paving the way for a bright future for every student.



THE ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

As part of our 30th Anniversary celebrations, All Saints Catholic Primary School has embraced its rich history with weekly Throwback Thursday posts on social media, featuring memorable moments from the past. Long-serving staff members are honoured through special interviews published in our anniversary newsletters. Our front office display, filled with historic photos and treasured memorabilia, invites students, parents, and guests to reflect on our journey over the last three decades.

For 30 years, All Saints Catholic Primary School has been a crucial part of the Seaford community. The school has significantly contributed to the growth and well-being of the area, especially in supporting the SCC Centre in Seaford, helping it become an important community hub. Over the years, Gina has witnessed significant changes at All Saints. The student population has grown from 94 to 539, reflecting the school's expansion and increasing diversity. She has also seen many changes in staff, and some former students returning as parents and even grandparents, creating a multi-generational community. The school's physical environment has transformed dramatically since Gina's early days. When she started, the Year 6/7 classroom was in the staffroom! The playground was nothing more than dirt, with no playground equipment.

The classrooms were transportable buildings, reflecting the humble beginnings of the school. Today, modern facilities provide a comfortable and stimulating learning environment for students and staff alike. Despite the growth in student and staff numbers, Gina notes that the sense of community at All Saints has remained strong. In the early days, the smaller school size meant that the community was more closely involved in school activities. Although the school has expanded, the commitment to fostering a supportive and inclusive community has endured.

Gina Cusano's journey at All Saints Catholic Primary School reflects the essence of dedication, adaptability, and community spirit. Her invaluable contributions and cherished memories are woven into our school's history, inspiring current and future students. HONOURING THE COMMITMENT OF GAYE 'BRIGGSY' BRIGGS

As we continue to honour the long-serving members of our All Saints community, it is impossible to overlook the contributions of Gaye Briggs, or as she is fondly known, "Briggsy." Gaye's journey with All Saints Catholic Primary School spans more than two decades, during which she has worn many hats and left an indelible mark on our school. Today, we look back at her incredible journey, celebrating the milestones and memories that have shaped her time with us.

When her first child started at All Saints in 1996, Briggsy began her journey as a volunteer, in classrooms, the Parents & Friends (P&F) Association, and 4 years on the School Board (2 as Chairperson). In 2000 she enjoyed one of 2 volunteer positions supporting Leadership. She supported the Principal one day a week, performing administrative and OHS&W tasks, and in 2001 she was supporting Reception classes as an ESO. In 2004, she won the position of Front Office Receptionist.

Throughout her tenure, Briggsy has held several key positions and reflecting on her time as the Front Office Receptionist, she shared, *"Four days a week, I was doing Receptionist, Enrolments, & ICT at the school."* As the presence of technology grew, she later became the ICT Coordinator and, after completing her ICT studies, was appointed as the Network Administrator.

When Briggsy first began at All Saints, the Leadership team included Bruno Viecei, Tina Adamo, and Anne Weygood. She remembers the camaraderie in the office, which was always busy, and full of life. She fondly recalls the welcoming atmosphere of All Saints, where parents, staff, and students all played a part in creating a warm and inclusive environment.

When asked what her fondest memories of All Saints were, she said, *"Being part of a growing new school! From the early days of developing the logo and vision statement to face painting at the school fete. Playing in the Staff/Parents Thanksgiving Liturgy band was also incredibly enjoyable."*

She also has happy memories of *"watching my 3 children grow and learn here, due to a fantastic team of teachers and leadership."*

Reflecting on the changes over the years, Briggsy noted the Seaford area changes, *"The growth of the whole area really. Grand Boulevard stopped where the roundabout now is, and you couldn't drive any further north—it was a dirt road at that end."* She also reminisced about the school's early days with technology, sharing, *"We had one computer in the library and one in the front office. The Principal, Deputy, and RE all had one, but that was all for staff. We now have over 600 users, 1:1 computing for most of the school and shared devices for the rest."*

One of Briggsy's favourite memories is of Principal Bruno Viecei dressing up as Strega Nonna (grandma witch) from the book by Tomie dePaola for the Book Week parade, complete with stockings! She also fondly remembers, *"The administration staff came as the seven dwarves to Book Week one year. It was such a laugh!"*

We asked Briggsy what are some interesting facts today's students wouldn't know about All Saints Catholic Primary School?

- All Saints has had soccer teams since 1998 – that's 26 years!
- The Tjilbruke Mosaic has been completely done twice, both times with students working on it supported by local artists.

Briggsy gives thanks for the previous dedicated parent communities and staff that have supported All Saints as it has grown. *"The P&F was always a massive part of the school,"* she recalls, *"meeting and having coffee in the office across the hall from the old Principal's office!"*

We would like to extend our deepest gratitude to Briggsy for her unwavering dedication and hard work over the years. Her commitment to the All Saints community, her adaptability in taking on various roles, and her genuine care for the students and staff have made a lasting impact on our school.

THE LONG-STANDING DEDICATION OF ALISON OLSDER

Throughout All Saints Catholic Primary School's history, there are a few longest-serving staff members who have helped shape our school. As we celebrate our 30th Anniversary this year, we have met with some of our long-standing staff members, so they can share their reflections and fond memories of All Saints. Among these cherished staff members is Alison Olsder, who began her journey with All Saints Catholic Primary School in 1996. Alison's story is a testament to the school's evolution, community spirit, and commitment to nurturing young minds.

Alison Olsder started her tenure at All Saints as a classroom teacher, instructing various year levels from Reception to Year 4. Her versatility and passion for teaching led her to teach in Science and before finding a new calling as a Library teacher. In this role, she continues to inspire students through books and learning.

One of Alison's most significant contributions to All Saints was the introduction of the LAP (Learning Assistance Program) and the establishment of the first Child Resource Centre (CRC). These initiatives have provided vital support to countless students, fostering an inclusive and supportive learning environment. Additionally, her commitment to environmental education has left a lasting legacy. "I implemented many environmental initiatives at All Saints such as composting, worm farms, grants for water tanks, tree planting days, Gutter Guardians, and Cleanup Australia Day," Alison recalls.

When Alison first joined All Saints, the school was under the leadership of Mr. Bruno Viecei, with Anne Weygood serving as the Religious Education Coordinator. These leaders were instrumental in shaping the school's ethos and community spirit.

Reflecting on her fondest memories, Alison shared many heartwarming moments. Among them was the unforgettable day Mr. Viecei played the Port Power song across the school to celebrate their premiership win.

Book Week parades, orchestrated by the creatively talented Mrs. Cusano (Another long-standing staff member!).

The school's facilities have also evolved dramatically. Initially, only some classrooms had air conditioning, leaving the office staff to endure extreme temperatures. Today, modern amenities ensure a comfortable learning and working environment for everyone. Technology integration has been another significant shift. The early days lacked computers, students, teachers and staff were relying solely on whiteboards or chalkboards. Now, digital tools are integral to the curriculum, enhancing educational experiences.

Alison states how environmental stewardship remains a core value at All Saints, but the once barren landscape now flourishes with trees planted over the years. Recreational facilities have improved with the addition of soccer and footy goals, and playground equipment. The introduction of a kitchen garden and cooking sessions with Mr. Goldfinch has enriched the curriculum, alongside specialised PE lessons.

Today's students might be surprised to learn that all our assemblies and school masses were once held in the Seaford Christian Churches (SEM) before the school had its hall. Alison recalls that before the SEM's construction, Sunday Mass took place in two transportable buildings joined together, which now serve as the library!

RECOGNISING THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF FRANCINE DOODY

Fran's journey with All Saints began in 1995 as a parent and volunteer, transitioning into an official role in 2007. Over the years, Fran has held a wide variety of roles that reflect her dedication and versatility. "I've been chairperson of the P & F twice, coordinated the uniform shop, led the LAP and Rainbow Reading programs, facilitated 'What's the Buzz', and offered classroom support," she says. Each role has brought her closer to students and families, deepening her connection to the All Saints community.

Thinking back to her early days, Fran recalls the leadership of Mr. Clancy and Anne Weygood, who were guiding the school when she first arrived. Her fondest memories span a range of events, from celebrating All Saints Day with a memorable whole-school walk to Moana Beach to participating in the school's "Shave Off Day, where Bruno Viecceli, myself, and others shaved our heads in support of a student with a brain tumour." It's clear that for Fran, these moments of solidarity and school spirit stand out as some of her most cherished.

Fran has seen many changes over the years, noting, "We're more inclusive now and can support so many more children and families." She also highlights the evolution of the school's physical structure and the joy of "working with staff that I knew as students of this school."

Fran's collection of amusing memories reflects the vibrant life at All Saints. One of her favorites is from Book Week, where "Mr. Clancy dressed up as a punk," and another involves a memorable day when "Bruno and a teacher tried to catch a snake on the oval using only a rubbish bin and a lid!"

When asked to share some facts about the school that current students might not know, Fran shared how All Saints' commitment to nature and community has also been long-standing. The wirra at the SEM was initially created by a teacher and Year 7 students, who collected and planted the seeds themselves! All Saints students also contributed to the Seaford Rise wetlands, planting sections south of Dalkeith Road.

From her early days as a parent to her various contributions as a staff member, Fran's impact on All Saints and her memories with the school form a lasting legacy.



MICHELLE GOLDFINCH'S JOURNEY OF SERVICE AT ALL SAINTS

Michelle Goldfinch's journey with All Saints Catholic Primary School is a testament to her dedication and love for the community. Her connection to the school began in 1997 when her daughter started at All Saints, and Michelle volunteered her time to support the school. "I was heavily involved with the P&F Committee and even became President," she shares. "We had so much fun and brought families together. We hosted everything from fetes to chocolate and bulb drives. But my favourite memory is the 'Shave Off' we organised to support the McGuinness/McDermott Foundation."

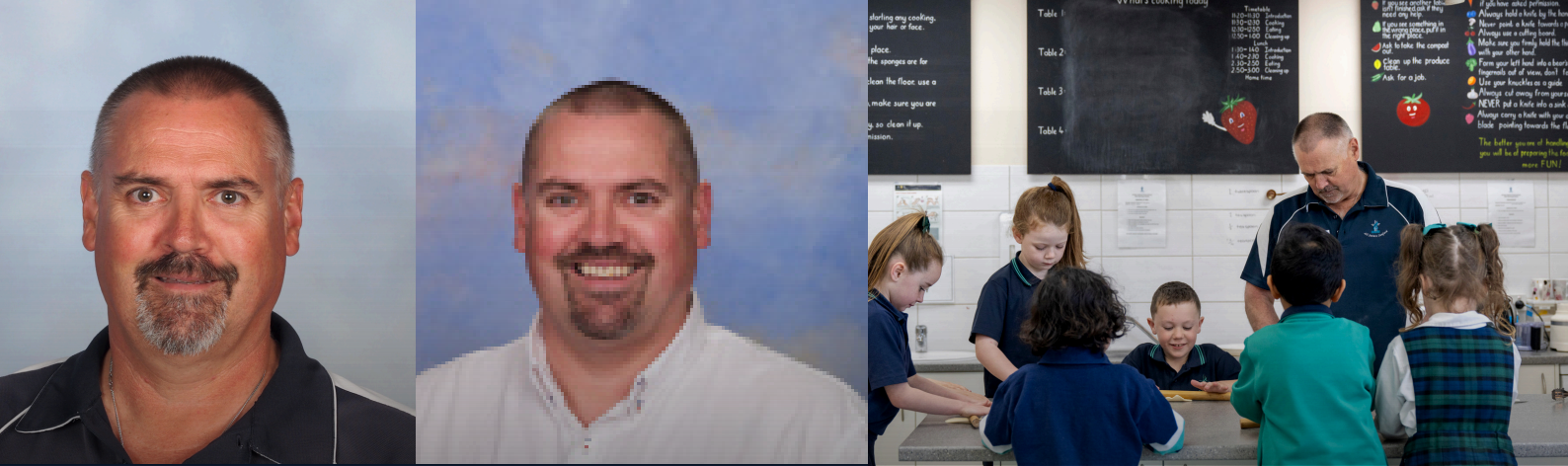
That particular fundraiser stands out as one of her proudest moments within the community. "We put out a challenge to the community: if they could raise \$500, a few dads would shave their heads. We ended up raising over \$5,000!" she laughs. Even the then-principal, Mr. Bruno Viecelli, jokingly promised to shave his head if they hit the target. Sure enough, with parents, kids, and even The Messenger newspaper getting involved, the entire school watched as Mr. Viecelli and several parents—including Michelle's husband, and ESO Craig Goldfinch—had their heads shaved in front of everyone. "It was such a proud, funny moment, and Tony McGuinness from the foundation even came to an assembly to accept the donation," she recalls.

In 2014, Michelle's role at All Saints shifted as she officially joined the staff as an ESO. She started working with the junior classes and eventually moved on to the upper grades, including Year 6. "I've worked in Year 7, Year 6, and Year 5 over the years, but the last few years, I've focused on Year 6 and run the QuickSmart Numeracy Program," she explains. Michelle's role has been diverse, as she also took on the Uniform Shop Coordinator position, always happy to pitch in wherever needed.

When reflecting on the changes she's seen, Michelle fondly recalls a different time. "The oval had no fencing, and children played freely at recess and lunch." She laughs, "It's hard to imagine now! No fences, no worries—definitely something you wouldn't see today!" But times have changed, and she's noticed a shift in how parents engage with the school. "There's not as much parent involvement now, which I miss. Back then, families had more time to volunteer and be a part of school life, but with everyone busier these days, it's harder for parents to get involved the same way," she reflects.

Michelle has witnessed All Saints expand significantly. "We've added more buildings, more staff, and of course, more students. It's much bigger than when my children attended, but it still has that close-knit community feel."

Throughout her time at All Saints, Michelle has been an essential part of both the school's history and its spirit. Her contributions, whether as a volunteer, a P&F President, or an ESO, reflect her deep connection to the school and its community. As she looks back on her many roles and memories, Michelle's story is one of joy, service, and lasting impact at All Saints Catholic Primary School.



FROM PARENT TO MENTOR: CRAIG GOLDFINCH'S 30 YEAR JOURNEY

Craig Goldfinch's connection to All Saints Catholic Primary School began in 1997, when his daughter Caitlin started in Reception. Like many involved parents, Craig soon found himself volunteering, beginning with the LAP (Learning Assistance Program), where he mentored children across various year levels. "I worked with several different children during my time in LAP," Craig reflects, acknowledging his long-term commitment to the school's community support ethos.

Craig's dedication didn't stop there. Alongside his wife, Michelle, Craig became deeply involved in the P&F Committee, playing an active role in supporting the school. In 2004, he officially joined the staff as an ESO, working closely with a new Reception student. Over the years, Craig has held multiple positions, working in various year levels as a Curriculum ESO and, since 2014, as the Kitchen Garden Specialist for the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Program which is a favourite among students. "Working with the kids in the garden has been incredibly rewarding. Teaching them about growing their own food and seeing their excitement is one of my favourite parts of the role," Craig says.

When asked about the leadership team when he first started, Craig recalls, "Bruno Viecelli was Principal, Tina Adamo was Deputy, and Ann Weygood was the REC." Fond memories like these highlight the strong leadership that guided All Saints during its earlier years.

In terms of changes, Craig has witnessed the school's physical transformation. "The changes in the buildings stand out the most. The year Caitlin started, they began building the rooms that are now the Kitchen, Year 1, and Year 4 classrooms," he notes. One fun fact he shares with today's students is that the current Kitchen was originally the Art Room, and the school even had a designated Computer Room where all the school's computers were housed for scheduled class lessons!

Craig also fondly remembers when "the oval wasn't fenced—there was no barrier between the Reception classes and the courts."

Craig's longstanding involvement with All Saints—whether as a parent, a volunteer, or a staff member—has left an indelible mark on the school's community. His journey reflects the heart of what makes All Saints special: a place where families, staff, and students come together to create something lasting.
